### Planning for your Future campaign 'highly commended' at national MJ Awards

Surrey County Council Adults Wellbeing and Health Partnership's pioneering campaign supporting residents to plan for the later life they want has been recognised as 'highly commended' at the prestigious Municipal Journal (MJ) Awards 2025. The Planning for Your Future campaign was honoured in the Innovation in Children's and Adults' Services category and the only adult services finalist.

With over 3,000 local residents joining the <u>free event programme</u> so far, the campaign, run in partnership with Age UK Surrey, aims to equip people to make informed decisions at a time when they may need extra support. The sessions, held in person and online, help people learn about care and support options, costs of social care and how to stay independent for longer as they get older. There is also a dedicated phone number and an online hub full of useful information, including a handy checklist.

Professionals, please encourage people you support to join a session. Feedback to date has been incredibly positive and other local authorities in the Southeast region are keen to learn from us and build upon the campaign.

#### NHS 10-year health plan for England: Fit for the future

England's 10-Year Health Plan is designed to improve the NHS by offering more care in local communities, using more digital tools, and making healthcare fairer for everyone. With £29 billion in funding, it will set up new local health centres, improve the NHS App, and give local councils more say in how health services are run. Areas like Surrey will need to create their own plans to meet local needs and provide joined-up care.

### Digital phone switchover: telecare campaign toolkit

The UK's old analogue landline phone system will be switched off in January 2026, with all services moving to digital connections. This change may especially affect older residents who rely on traditional landlines and may not have broadband.

Local councils are working with phone companies to prepare those who use telecare devices, such as fall alarms. However, some people may still be unaware - particularly if their devices aren't council-provided. Most equipment should still work after the switch, but a backup is



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needed in case of power cuts. Scammers often try to take advantage of vulnerable people during technology changes like this.

BT and Virgin Media have launched a government-backed campaign urging telecare users to contact their phone provider. The Local Government Association has also created a toolkit to help raise awareness.

### **Smokefree Generation Grant Award Scheme for VCSE organisations**

Surrey County Council is offering grants of up to £7,000 to voluntary, community, and social enterprise (VCSE) organisations to support efforts in helping people stop smoking. The Smokefree Generation Grant Award Scheme aims to reduce smoking-related illness and deaths by funding projects that raise awareness, promote free stop smoking services, and encourage smokefree environments.

A total of £100,000 is available, with funding lasting 12 months. Eligible organisations must be based in areas administered by Surrey County Council.



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There will be an online briefing session with a short presentation on the purpose of the grant and how to apply, followed by a Q&A on Wednesday 6 August 2025, from 12.30pm to 1.30pm.

#### **New CQC Chief Inspector of Adult Social Care and Integrated Care**

Chris Badger has been appointed as <u>CQC's new Chief Inspector of Adult Social Care and Integrated Care and will join in September.</u>

Chris has spent 15 years working across roles in adult social care and has shown clear commitment to improving the care provided to people who use and rely on adult social care services. He will join CQC from Hertfordshire County Council where he is currently Director of Adult Care Services.

His appointment is the fourth of four CQC Chief Inspector roles that will lead on regulation and improvement across mental health, hospitals, primary and community care, and adult social care – marking a realignment of the organisation around sector expertise.

#### New NHS campaign to increase uptake of cervical screening in Southeast

The NHS is launching a new campaign across the Southeast to increase awareness about the importance of cervical screening, encourage those eligible to attend a cervical screening appointment, and help support healthy, lifelong screening behaviours.

The NHS has launched a new campaign in the Southeast called Love Your Cervix to raise awareness about cervical screening and encourage more young women, especially those aged 25 to 29, to attend their appointments. This age group has the lowest attendance, with one in three not going to their first screening. In some areas, fewer than 60% of young women take part, well below the national target of 80%. The campaign aims to change this by offering education, support, and outreach to help women understand the importance of screening and feel more comfortable attending.

#### **Banstead Social Prescribing opens for self-referrals**

From 1 July 2025, adults registered with a GP in Banstead can now refer themselves to the local Social Prescribing service, run by Mary Frances Trust. The service continues to accept referrals from GPs and other health professionals.



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Social Prescribing helps people with emotional wellbeing, loneliness, healthy lifestyle changes, employment or volunteering, welfare advice, and support for carers. It connects individuals to local community services that can offer the right kind of help.

#### Closure of Safe Harbour

The Safe Harbour crisis prevention service, run by Mary Frances Trust, is coming to an end after its pilot year. Safe Harbour is a six-week rolling programme focused on prevention, early intervention, and action planning.

As part of the planned closure:

- Epsom Safe Harbour will close on 1 August 2025 and is no longer accepting referrals.
- Woking Safe Harbour will remain open until 30 October 2025, with referrals accepted until 15 September 2025. Referrals can be made through the <u>Catalyst Support website</u>.

The <u>Safe Havens</u> crisis support service remains open for anyone experiencing a mental health crisis.

### **Prescribing Nature**

Mary Frances Trust is part of a new partnership with RSPB, Surrey County Council, Forestry England, and <u>Terravita WTP</u> to launch <u>RSPB's Nature Prescription</u> booklets in Surrey. These booklets are designed to help people reconnect with nature to support their mental health and wellbeing.

Through services like the <u>Nature Nurtures Project</u>, <u>GP Integrated Mental Health Service</u> (<u>GPimhs</u>), and <u>Social Prescribing</u>, the team can now use the booklets to guide conversations and help people find calm, connection, and confidence in the natural world.

# Catalyst Counselling re-opens for new referrals

Catalyst Counselling is offering up to twenty-four sessions of counselling, collaboratively reviewed every six weeks, to people who are concerned about their drug or alcohol use and/or have mild to moderate mental health concerns, such as anxiety and depression.

Face-to-face sessions are running in Woking and Godalming, along with online MS Teams counselling during the day and evenings. ### First Community Quality Account for 2024/25

First Community has published its Quality Account for 2024/25.

The report explains the quality of NHS health and care services provided by First Community in east Surrey and West Sussex. It looks at different aspects of quality, including patient safety, how effective treatments are, and what patients say about their care and experiences.

The account reviews how they performed against last year's priorities and outlines their goals and areas they plan to improve in the future.

## New specialist outreach service for women affected by gambling

#### **Breaking Down Barriers Workshop**

<u>Sight for Surrey</u> is running a Breaking Down Barriers workshop for professionals in Surrey. The session offers an overview of inclusion, accessibility, and independence for people who are Deaf, hard of hearing, blind, partially sighted, or deafblind.

The workshop includes personal insights into daily life, its challenges and opportunities. It covers practical support, accessible technology, communication tools, and how Sight for Surrey works with adults and children across the county.

The aim is to inspire and equip professionals to become champions for access and inclusion, helping to remove barriers so everyone can live independently at home, at work, and in the community.

#### **TapSOS**

TapSOS is a free, accessible emergency app designed to support individuals who are Deaf, hard of hearing, speech impaired or anyone who might need a voice-free way to report an emergency. It enables users to request help without the need for verbal communication or



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relying on someone else to call for assistance. With an easy-to-navigate interface and customisable features, TapSOS enhances personal safety and independence, connecting directly to emergency services across the UK and sharing vital medical details and location data at the tap of a screen, with no speaking required.

# New community diagnostic centre opens in Woking

A <u>new diagnostic centre</u> has opened at Woking Community Hospital, giving people in northwest Surrey better access to healthcare. The centre offers faster and easier diagnostic tests, helping patients get quicker diagnoses and better treatment outcomes.

It's open seven days a week and provides a wide range of services—from simple blood and hearing tests to the latest imaging technology including MRI and CT scanning.

#### **Fuel poverty cookery courses**

The Communities & Prevention Coordinators within Adults Wellbeing and Health Partnerships in Surrey County Council are working with community partners across Surrey to deliver fuel-efficient cookery courses. These courses teach practical skills and knowledge about healthy eating, and participants receive energy-efficient cooking equipment to help them continue these habits long term. So far, 202 people have signed up, and over 67 air fryers or slow cookers have been distributed. The sessions will continue to run until autumn.

# **RecoveryFest returns in August**

The Recovery College, provided by Surrey and Borders Partnership NHS Foundation Trust, will be hosting its annual <u>RecoveryFest</u> on Wednesday 6 August 2025 from 1pm to 4pm. ### **Cost of living support from Surrey Coalition**

As part of a new project funded by Surrey County Council (SCC), <u>Surrey Coalition</u> is able to allocate £49 fuel vouchers (one voucher per household) to their members who need extra support with high fuel bills.

As part of their <u>cost-of-living support</u>, energy efficient appliances such as microwaves or air fryers can be offered to those without a means of cooking. The appliances will be delivered by a third-party company, with permission needed to share a delivery address.
