Questions, Answers and Comments:

Comment

Sabrina mentioned that there may be different information that is key from different groups. For example, autistic people and/or autistic parents. Autism can be hereditary, surrounding network could be disabled people. Would be good to raise this specific work to the different groups.

John mentioned that now we are moving forward in "covid times" there is a push to get back to normality and come out of the virtual meeting world, however autistic people seem to prefer to still meet in this way. When you meet in person you can't control the room, and this can be very stressful experience as the unpredictability of a meeting can present many challenges. When you meet virtually you can control the screen, you can use mute options, you don't have to appear on camera if your area having a challenging moment. Is anyone else feeling this way?

Comment

Bex agreed with this. There are a lot of sensory challenges that are incorporated with this. Lots of conversation, lights etc. Processing can be harder when in a room with other people, however virtually being able to manage the screen and being in a comfortable setting change things.

Comment

Liz – Choice is really important as things can change on the day of an event depending on how people are feeling. We really want to recognise that.

Comment

Jenny – Sensory issues means that senses in general are heightened, and things can feel overwhelming. You can't necessarily regulate this when you are in the same space as other people. The intensity can be overwhelming.

Comment

Sabrina- it can feel that it is almost as though autistic people can be shamed for not being social and preferring to stay in a virtual world. This is not the case and is very much down to the individual. We do not all fit under one bracket, and we are always fighting against the stigma. We want to come but we struggle being in person so actually we are more social through a different tool. Having the choice gives the ability to save our energy to be present and social in a different environment. Otherwise, it could look like autistic people aren't social and just want to stay at home, but this is not the case.

Comment

Ruben – Perhaps a reasonable adjustment in this area needs to be considered. Body language can be really unclear to read and especially online. Perhaps showing more than just a face on screen could be helpful. The more you see of a person the more you can understand.
