This new service to be assessed is called the Reunification Service Support (RSS), which launched in October 2022 following a year-long pilot.

Reunification is when a looked after child or young person (referred to as a child in this document) returns home to live within their family network following a period of being in Local Authority Care. Reunification is most successful when it is well planned, based on robust assessment of risks considering the child and birth family. If planned well, children go home slowly and where appropriate, services are put in place to support the family for as long as they are needed.

The overall aims of the reunification service support are to:

- Ensure that children can return to the care of their parent(s) [or other person within the family network] at the earliest opportunity, if safe to do so and in their best interests
- Ensure that when reunification occurs, it is successful [with the child remaining at home, and not needing to return to Care within a 6-month timeframe]
- Reduce the overall cost to Children's Services by investing in the support required for successful reunification to occur, knowing this will save in the longer-term.

RSS contains 5 distinct phases which will be bespoke to each child and family. We will invest in the support required once a child returns home, knowing that this is very much an 'invest to save' intervention with the costs being recuperated by successful reunification. In addition, this will be a countywide approach therefore reaching every child at the time that is right for them, rather than a quadrant pilot.

The 5 phases are:

- 1.) Identification: where social workers identify and request service
- 2.) Planning: RSS consider and plan the reunification
- 3.) Implementation: services are provided to the family in the areas needed to support positive reunification
- 4.) Review: evaluate results
- 5.) Reunification: Reunification is achieved and discharge/revocation of orders/care arrangements are progressed

The reunification service is a service for all SCC-looked after children and their carers/families irrespective of any protected characteristic(s).

Provision of the service is based on the suitability of the children returning to their parents/family networks care and the readiness of their parents/family networks to care for the children independently of care arrangements.

Any social worker for a looked after child can request the service and all requests will be assessed with the same sets of criteria.

No protected characteristics are a criterion of whether reunification can proceed.
