Surrey County Council has a statutory requirement under the Public Libraries and Museums Act 1964; to provide a comprehensive and efficient library service. In providing this service, councils must, among other things:

- "encourage both adults and children to make full use of the library service (section7(2)(b))"
- "lend books and other printed material free of charge for those who live, work or study in the area (in accordance with section 8(3)"

The library service in Surrey has a network of 52 libraries, including 10 that are Community Partnered Libraries (CPLs). These are Bagshot, Bramley, Byfleet, Ewell Court, Lingfield, New Haw, Stoneleigh, Tattenhams, Virginia Water and Warlingham. CPLs are run by volunteers, with their own trustees and management committee, however, they are supported by the County Council who cover the costs for the library book budget, Van Delivery costs, Summer Reading Challenge materials, IT costs, Telephony and Property Costs. They are further supported by teams from across the wider library service. The first CPLs were set up in 2012 and the final one was set up in 2016.

Supporting the CPLs costs the council £477,889 of which £160,554 of this is within the library service's control. (See table A)

The service budget is currently, £6,482,000 and is made up of staffing and supplies and services which include the Library Book Budget.

As the library service is required to make budget reductions in order to contribute to the overall medium term financial plan of the council, the service is proposed to make £182,733 worth of savings from 2023/2024.

Since 2018, the library service has made £3m of savings from its controllable budgets therefore, opportunities to drive further savings in the current model are more limited than previously was the case. One option is for the CPLs to take on more of the costs of delivering their service.

To allocate the £182,733 reductions equitably across the service it is proposed that £102,179 comes from the allocation of resources to the 42 libraries in the main Surrey Libraries network (this is covered in a separate EIA) and the remaining £80,554 is proposed to come from the 10 Community Partnered Libraries. This comprises £57,821 from the Library book budget, £22,000 from the Library Transport Budget and £733 from the cost of providing Summer Reading Challenge materials. In total, this is a 16.85% of the total cost of supporting the CPLs.

The IT, telephony and property costs are not part of the library service's budget and so are out of scope of these proposed reductions. Any future savings from these budgets would still be a net savings for the council.

This document will look at the impact of transferring the financial responsibility to the CPLs of the Library Book Budget, the Summer Reading Challenge and their proportion of the van delivery service. The change will affect all residents and users of the service, so there would be little impact on any of the individual protected characteristics. However, the rationale for writing this Equality Impact Assessment is to identify impact amongst residents with protected characteristics likely to be affected by this change and key actions to mitigate impact.

Library Book Budget

The book stock for the CPLs is currently funded from the main library book budget. (General reductions to the Library Book budget are covered in a separate EIA). It is proposed that the CPLS will take on the cost of their proportion of this budget with the remaining reductions allocated proportionately across the other 42 libraries in the network.

The table below shows the latest spend from the book budget in the closest normal year (Covid reasons and in-year budget cuts have skewed more recent figures)

Van Delivery Service

The CPLs are also included in our van delivery service. This provides a transport service around the county to satisfy reservations and other deliveries to the CPLs. The proportionate cost to the CPLs of the van contract would be £22,000.

This is currently an indicative figure and the cost of the van delivery service will be confirmed with the new contract.

Summer Reading Challenge

The Summer Reading Challenge is an annual national reading scheme run by the Reading Agency which is delivered in partnership with all UK public libraries to encourage children aged between 4 and 11 to enjoy the benefits of reading for pleasure over the summer holidays. This scheme generates visits from children throughout the summer and is a very popular scheme which has been running for over 20 years. All libraries in Surrey take part in the challenge and the supporting materials are bought centrally from the Reading Agency. The proportionate costs for the CPLs to take part in the Challenge in 2022 was £733. The CPLs had 736 children participating, which was 7% of the total 10,430 children taking part across the county. This works out at around £1 per child in the CPLs.

The library service has 323,694 registered members (membership data March 2022). As part of the registration process the service does not collect data regarding members dates of birth so we are unable to provide exact data, however, users are placed into certain categories such as Child, Young Person, Adult, Concession and Open Ticket (our card for vulnerable users). This data is represented below. It is recognised that the reach of the service is far greater than the number of registered users as evidenced through the SCC (Surrey County Council) Library and Cultural Services Strategy 2020-2025 and as a universal service any of the counties 1.2million residents are able to access library services as they are free at the point of access.

Whilst this cannot be directly compared with population data due to the wide range of ages each library membership category covers, we are conscious that compared to the population both children and young people and over 65s are overrepresented as library members

Disability

• The library service has 323,694 registered members (membership data March 2022) and although the service does not monitor the number of people with disabilities amongst its membership, the library service offers Open Ticket membership categories for residents who have a 'short- or long-term medical condition that has a substantial and negative effect on their day-to-day life'. 181 of those customers use the Library Direct service which is for those residents who find it difficult or impossible to visit a library themselves because of illness, disability, mobility problems or caring responsibilities (including young carers). Current library membership of these different categories is shown below:

- 9 Open Ticket aged 0-4
- 18 Open Ticket aged 5-15
- 48 Open Ticket aged 16-17
- 6406 Open Ticket aged 18+ 181 Library Direct member (all ages) 9 169 48 6,406 181
